gtg is one in the series of TheatreWorks' efforts to create platforms and springboards for artistes and creators to showcase their creative works. This time round, it concentrates on the fresh talents and new voices of Singapore. Hopefully, this lot will be the new breed of Singapore theatre, creating and producing fresh new shows in the coming years.

gtg, the first overnight theatre in Singapore, is also created for the audience. It is an adventure and a fresh approach to watching performances. While the concept is new in Singapore, it is not so in some parts of the world where ritualistic performances are held through the night to give thanks to the gods.

In these bad economic times, while there are calls for arts groups to "downsize", we are determined not to let this crisis affect our creative energy. I cannot see any way one can "downsize" one's expression or one's soul. As TheatreWorks has to be realistic and cost-conscious, we have to find creative ways to mount the show. With that, gtg became one massive production with 20 performances, 65 performers, 11 directors, 12 playwrights and more than 50 musicians, not to mention the number of stage managers, production crew, technicians and other helpers. This is made possible because of the commitment and dedication from the participants and volunteers, and the faith of our sponsors who stand by us in such times.

### ot to eat .... Cafe



Formed in late 1997 in the aftermath of the Hong Kong handover, Becky's Raincoat plays therapeutic music, or rather music for therapy, or to be precise, music for their therapy. They are united by a common desire to share their misery and thus divide by multiplication of their woes. The band has an unhealthy preoccupation with thought-provoking, sinus-clearing music a la Counting Crows and Dave Matthews Band.

# Awakening & The Survival of the Filtest

#### 6:00am to 7:45am

### Prayer

"I breathe ... balancing ... wrinkled embrace ... empty cradle ... burden ... doubt I can float ... burnt rice... return to where I've been ... ". This movement piece explores the experience of life rituals. In its three parts: Rite, Incarnation and Prayer, the performers' going in and out of the several characters parallels the cycles of birth and rebirth the soul goes through, linking the existence of the people who are now living with that of those who are dead and those yet to be born. # L E A R

Commissioned by the Japan Foundation in 1997 after The Flying Circus Project, Lear made its world premiere in Tokyo. A re-invention of Shakespeare's Lear, this production of the well-known play was conceived and directed by Ong Keng Sen and written by Rio Kishida. This version of the play focuses on the concept of patriarchy in contemporary society. Featuring traditional and contemporary Asian artists from China, Japan, Indonesia, Thailand, Malaysia and Singapore, it is a production that attempts to negotiate the old world, the existing world, and the future world. Focussing on the daughter who kills her/father, Lear was on a macro level, New Asia trying to break the bonds of history and the past. It deals with the important issue of younger generations in Asia who battle with the patriarchy and paternal figures who leave their legacy behind. Ultimately, the production of Lear emphasises an Asia of difference, identity and cultural negotiation.

TheatreWorks has produced critically acclaimed works that have earned the company a reputation for being the best theatre company in Singapore. The company has toured internationally since 1992. This year, EAT ME was presented at Journey to the East 1998: One Table, Two Chairs in Hong Kong (Jan) and most recently, Descendants of the Eurouch Admiral was presented in Germany at the Hamburg Int'l Summer Festival and House of World Cultures, Berlin (August).

With a varied programme, TheatreWorks' repertoire spans from popular plays like Beauty World & Lao Jiu to visual experiences such as The Yang Family (performed in a Chinatown shophouse), Destinies of Flowers in the Mirror (performed inside the Suntec City Fountain) and Workhorse Afloat. TheatreWorks has also spearheaded the concept of outdoor theatre with their productions Theatre Carminal on the Hill, Longing and Broken Birds. This year, there will be gtg got to go..., play till dawn in September. These productions are testimonies to the company's commitment to develop theatre audiences qualitatively, as well as quantitatively. After starting the wave of popular theatre, TheatreWorks is now forging a new path with their cutting-edge works. With emphasis on inter-disciplinary and intercultural styles and techniques, the works often blur the line between theatrs, installation art, video art, photography, sound, sculptures, dance and architecture.

As a pioneering theatre company, TheatreWorks realises its responsibility in nurturing and providing opportunities for theatre practitioners. Training programmes such as The Writer's Laboratory have forged closer ties juilt Singaporean playwrights, serving to encourage and nurture new writing, 1998 also saw the return of the 24-hr Playwriting Competition, this time round held in the zoo, and the launch of The Singapore Dramatist Awards, a national award that recognises good playwriting.

In the last quarter of 1996, TheatreWorks embarked on The Flying Circus Project. This major project, conceptualised and headed by TheatreWorks' Artistic Director, Ong Keng Sen, examines the traditional arts and seeks to take them into the 21° Century. The first production of the project was the Japan Foundation's production of Lear (1997) which premiered in Tokyo with a multi-cultural cast. Lear will tour Hong Kong, Singapore, Jakarta and Perth Jan/Feb 1999. 1998's project will see seminars, workshops and performances by practitioners from India, Korea, Myanmar and Singapore.

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
