

This theatre carnival is the logical continuation of the Retrospective of Singapore Plays which Theatreworks presented in Nov - Dec 90. Instead of looking back at plays of the past, Theatre Carnival on the Hill focusses on new writing. The result is an interesting diversity, a potpourri of honesty, social concerns, sexual politics, human relationships, stories, melodrama and theatricality.

But more than a festival of new writing, it is a people festival. It is a people festival designed for a fresh audience who will be introduced to youthful exuberant theatre and new ways of enjoying themselves based on the carnival concept. It gives the audience the choice and free will to do what they want during a two week duration. It is a people festival based on mass participation without discrimination, the 'indie' music, the theatre, the dance and mime will be extremely raw. With this festival, we have welcomed and embraced all groups who have expressed an interest in being a part of it. It is a people festival in that we are hosting many other theatre and arts groups with different backgrounds. The carnival allows the mainstream and the alternative to co-exist side by side. It provides a platform for new young talents and it will see the introduction of more new faces than ever before. 
Performances are organised regularly. This serves to expose students and members to the performing arts. It also paves the way for choreographers to realise their creativity.

The Battle Box is a World War II Underground Command Centre at Fort Canning.

The Underground Command Centre was completed in 1936 to be used in the event of war as the nerve centre for British Military Operations in SE Asia. Commonly known as the 'Bunkers' or 'Battle Box', the Centre was a complex of corridors and rooms nine metres underground. Here on the evening of 15 February 1942, Lt-Gen Percival met with the allied commanders to decide whether to fight on or surrender to the Japanese.

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TheatreWorks (S) Ltd, a registered charity, was incorporated in February 1985 as the first English language adult professional theatre company in Singapore.

TheatreWorks has over its seven years of existence produced critically acclaimed and successful productions. The company is recognised for its refreshing interpretations of plays and its experimental approach. The successful fusion of Western and

Eastern dramatic traditions in its productions have earned its reputation of being a highquality theatre company.

As an older theatre company, TheatreWorks realises its responsibility to provide opportunities for and impart skills to practitioners. In particular, this is the aim of the Theatre Carnival on the Hill. It also sees as its responsibility to build up theatre audiences both quantitatively and qualitatively.

In this respect, TheatreWorks has commissioned numerous Singaporean plays which has contributed greatly to attracting capacity audience.

The company has forged closer ties with Singaporean playwrights by establishing the Writers' Laboratory. TheatreWorks has just completed the first year of the Writers' Laboratory project.
