The Writers' Laboratory is TheatreWorks' commitment to the development of playwriting in Singapore.

This is the seventh in the playwriting series from TheatreWorks' Writers' Laboratory. The Lab Report series introduces plays-in-progress written by participants in the Writers' Laboratory workshops in the form of dramatised play readings.

As with all Lab readings, we invite you, the audience to join us after the read to give feedback to the playwright. Your comments will help them to assess their work.

WHAT IS THE WRITERS' LABORATORY?

The concept of the Writers' Laboratory, brainchild of TheatreWorks' Artisitic Director, Ong Keng Sen, was mooted in late 1990 at a gathering of Singapore writers at the Drama Centre. The aim of the Lab is to nurture and develop playwriting in Singapore. TheatreWorks Writers' Lab was inaugurated in April 1991.

The Lab is a unique self-help writing programme developed and organised by TheatreWorks. The result of the Lab - more Singapore plays , and an increasing awareness and recognition of Singapore playwriting. The Writers' Lab has also attracted attention overseas and a similar Lab has been set up in Perth, Western Australia, called the Swy Lab.

The Singapore Press Holdings has been sponsoring this important developmental programme of Singaporean theatre since its inauguration. SPH has been supportive and encouraging in the development of theatre in Singapore.

THE WILLIAM SUN WORKSHOPS...

Dr William Sun and his wife Dr Faye C Fei have been specially invited to conduct a series of three workshops for members of the Writers' Lab and the public.

William is a teacher, author, playwright and director now residing in the United States. Presently the Associate Professor at the Tufts University's Drama Department, he is also the special overseas correspondent for a Shanghai paper, Theatre Arts. Before going to the States, he was a Professor teaching at the prestigious Shanghai Theatre Academy. His area of speciality is Shakespeare and Beijing opera - and how these diverse disciplines can be fused and performed.

The three month stint at TheatreWorks, which stated in May, consisted of a series of 4 public lectures on theatre in China; a public workshop in English for aspiring playwrights; a masterclass conducted specially for selected participants of the Writers' Lab and for the first time, a specialist workshop for playwrights writing in both English and Chinese. The plays in progress you will be watching today is the culmination of the work done by the participants of the three workshops.

Min seems her usual not-so-nice self, but trouble is more than being fed-up about school or the cafeteria food. Besides this, Siew's friend is having some domestic problems needing her listening ear. Also, a stray cat has adopted a reluctant Siew. And her neighbour seems to be reliving motherhood through her and Min. Then, there's the anonymous caller who just wouldn't stop calling, who is becoming more than irritating. Siew's dream is becoming more real than she thought...
