**38 AMOY STREET**

**Number 38** Amoy Street was a rice warehouse in the early years of Singapore's history in the 19th century. In its later years, it was divided to house many sub-tenants - as many as 16 families. It was also the home of an abbot from the nearby temple and recently was the studio/residence of renown Singaporean artist, Jimmy Ong. **This** century old three-storey shop house is a metaphor for Mrs Yang, the matriach. Mrs Yang is confronted by change from future generations; just as this house has been earmarked for redevelopment. This is possibly the last time that the house will be seen in its original state.



**HOW TO GET THERE**

**By Car** ~ Enter through Telok Ayer Street, pass Thian Hock Kheng Temple, go straight and turn right at the junction of Telok Ayer and McCallum Streets. You will see another Chinese Temple in the corner. Turn right again and keep driving. Number 38 is located on the right next to the car park. **Limited** parking on the street.

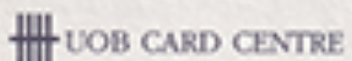
