Synopsis

Marco Polo is about two blind friends who are reacquainted after death. They quickly discover that they are both still blind and proceed to attempt to figure if they ended up in Heaven or Hell. Amidst the uncertainty, they begin to understand what it is to be lonesome, fearful and utterly lost. The friends attempt to recapture the emotions invested in the lives of the living and within oneself. Eventually, it is about hope, and above love.

Playwright's Message

Madame de Stael once said Comprendre, c'est pardoner. Marco Polo is a story about two travelers who discover the value of forgiveness, friendship, love and hope. In a quiet but hopeful voice, the narrative seeks to ask what value one would place on Truth and Fact. When faced with insurmountable facts, does the seemingly indefatigable human spirit give in, or are our fallibilities the very reason for our existence?

As the traveler Marco Polo had done before, this play invites you to journey within to discover where the real truths lie – within ourselves, and in each other. Perhaps then will we forgive ourselves and understand the reason for our time here.

Writing & Community is a process-based programme which evolved from the TheatreWorks Writers' Lab that began in 1990.

Firstly, it seeks out potential playwrights from within the community through its annual **24-Hour Playwriting Competition** (started in 1998). The competition is open to everyone living in Singapore. Next, theatre professionals will be invited to work on the winning scripts from the competition and to develop the scripts into full productions. Through this process, the winning playwrights are nurtured and developed. These full productions are then returned to the community by way of the annual **Performance Tour** with free performances at six venues in the community, primarily of the South East District.


Writing & Community is part of TheatreWorks Engagement Unit's efforts to raise awareness and create dialogues about issues through theatre and other programmes which include talks, film screenings among others. The past performance tours have seen successful runs for the past four years. The staging of these winning scripts plays an important role in our society, putting forth difficult yet relevant social issues to engage the community. Serunding in 2010 and 2011 saw attempts to address the issue of family, parent-child relations; Saying Grace in 2012 brought about issues of mental illness which led to eating disorders. Of Babies (not really) and People in 2013 touched on other taboo issues of surrogacy, family, friendship in relation to race and religion.

Ever since, he has been exposed to all the different aspects of theatre, not just acting or directing. He spends his personal time writing, which is another of his passion. Thus, an attempt to combine both his passion,

led him to discover playwriting. The

24-Hour Playwriting Competition was his maiden attempt at
competitive writing and also his first win. He looks to expand
his experiences in theatre, not as an outlet for words but as an
art form, and possibly a career in writing/playwriting.



Australian born, Sean Tobin has been working in Singapore since 1993 as a director, teacher, writer and a performer. In recent years he has co-written and directed What Did You Learn Today? and Tongues, both of which were commissioned by M1 Singapore Fringe Festival. Tongues, co-written with Jason Wee was published by Maths Paper Press the




same year. In 2012, he directed The Perfection of 10, an Esplanade Studios commission. He worked with 10 playwrights and 10 theatre companies to assemble a piece about perfection. Apart from performing in his own works in 2012, he performed in Serendipity as part of Cake Theatre's Decimal Points: First Station, in 2013 As former Associate Artistic Director of The Necessary Stage (2001-2004) he directed productions such as Such Sweet Sorrow, Sing Song, Oh Manl And Close In My Face. Since 2009, Sean has been Head of the Theatre faculty at School of the Arts, Singapore.

Actor, Bright Ong

An alumni scholar of the Singapore Repertory Theatre's (SRT) Young Co., Bright also graduated from the National University of Singapore with a Bachelor's degree in Geography with a Minor in Theatre Studies. An individual whose creativity and energy is driven by his passion for what the Arts has to offer to society, he chose to major in performance art for the



rest of his life. With a great respect for all genres of performing, Bright has always found the stage to be his 'home'. He is very grateful to be cast in multiple theatre shows for young audiences, most notably PLAYtime! with the Esplanade, as well as an increasing number of contemporary physical pieces. Currently, Bright is working on a new channel for children called ZooMoo as a puppeteer and voice-over artist. The show is shot and aired internationally and he hopes to one day, work with The Muppets!



Ebi Shankara graduated from the Nanyang Academy Of Fine Arts in 2008 with a Diploma in Theatre. He then furthered his studies in 2011-12 to gain First Class Honors Degree in Acting, His credits began to rise as he joined Buds Theatre in 2004 as well as The Young Company with Singapore Repertory Theatre and worked once again with Wild Rice on, Cinderellah! and Oil



Sleeping Beauty. Ebi was one in only five candidates chosen by the National Arts Council to represent Singapore as a performer in the ASEAN Youth Camp held in Brunei. In 2008, he finished his two tertiary graduation plays Zero, a collaboration with theatre Mandiri from Indonesia and Metamorphosis directed by acclaimed Australian director John Clarke. Later that year, he had the greatest honor to host Singapore's National Day Parade at the Marina Bay Floating Platform.

Set & Lighting Designer, Mohd Fared Jainal

A recipient of the Goh Chok Tong Youth Promise Award, Fared engages in cross-disciplinary work that delves into the realms of both visual and performing arts. He graduated with a Master In Arts (Design) from Open University/LASALLE College of the Arts. Fared has collaborated extensively with various theatre and art



groups in Singapore as a director, performer, visual artist and set designer. Pop Station, his collaboration with local art collective KYTV has traveled to Berlin, Bangkok and Indonesia. The Gingerbread Man (Singapore Repertory Theatre), a collaboration with LASALLE College of the Arts, earned him Best Set Design for 2007 Life! Theatre Awards. His work The Comedy of the Tragic Goats by Cake Theatre won him Best Director for 2009 Life! Theatre Awards, and Cuckoo Birds, collaboration between Cake Theatre and Five Arts Centre, Malaysia, won him Best Set Design for 8th BOH Cameronian Arts Awards 2009.
